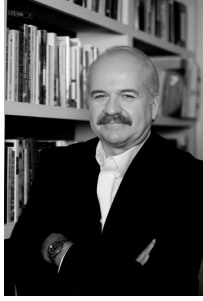


Lt. Mark Wynn
